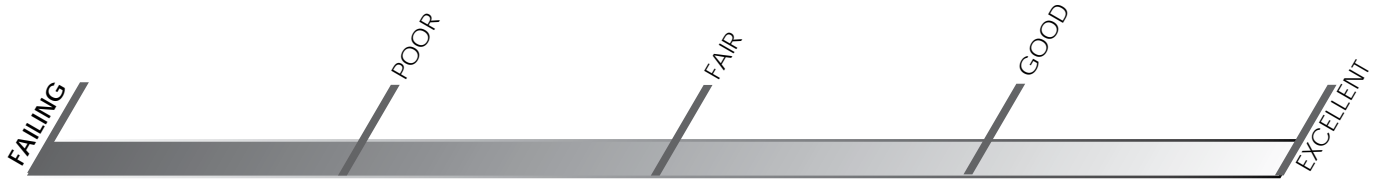


ORAL QUIZ ON THE CHEROKEE

The points given below are those that an upper-grammar student might be expected to know from his reading. You may also use these points to prompt your student.

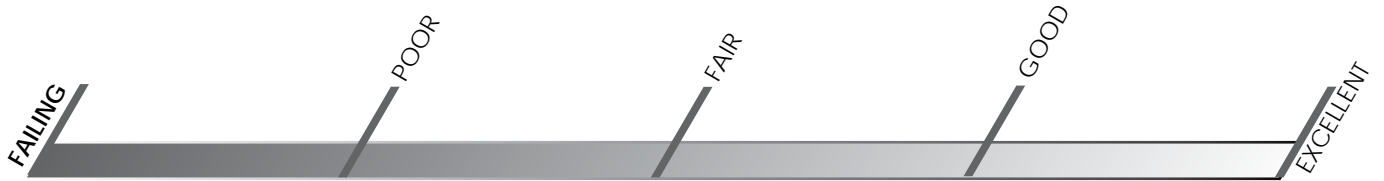
1. Why were the Cherokee forced to move west?
A law [the Indian Removal Act of 1830] signed by President Andrew Jackson said that the Cherokee had to move west and give up their land to the government.
2. How many Cherokee were forced to move west?
Resources indicate that there were 16,000 Cherokee forced to move west.
3. How many miles was their journey, and how long did it take?
The Cherokee were forced to walk 800 miles, and it took them over six months to complete.
4. From what states did they begin their trip, and in what state did it end?
The march began from the states of Alabama, Georgia, and North Carolina and ended in Oklahoma.
5. How many Cherokee died on the journey west?
More than 4,000 Cherokee died on the journey.
6. Why was this journey called the Trail of Tears?
Because the journey was long and harsh, over 4,000 Cherokee got sick from a lack of food and disease and sadly died. The Cherokee called this experience the "Place Where They Cried," which became the "Trail of Tears" in English.

Supply the correct word or words for each of the following sentences.

1. In the 1800's, pioneers bravely traveled west on the Oregon Trail in order to make new homes, farms, and towns out of the wilderness in the Oregon Territory.
2. Three pathways that they could travel on went through a part of the Rocky Mountains and were called the Oregon Trail, the Mormon Trail, and the California Trail.
3. People went west to be able to practice their religion, find gold to get rich, or for more fertile farmland.
4. The popular wagon that the pioneers journeyed in usually had a canvas cover treated with linseed oil that made it waterproof.
5. Guidebooks recommended that the pioneers take huge amounts of food on their journey, including 100 pounds of flour for each adult, 70 pounds of bacon, 30 pounds of hardtack, as well as beans, rice, coffee, sugar, dried fruits, baking soda, and vinegar.
6. Most families began their journey from Independence, Missouri, where overlanders met to make preparations.
7. On the Great Plains, families encountered different kinds of animals like the buffalo, which was considered best of all because they could preserve large amounts of meat for food.
8. Since firewood was scarce on the trip, dried buffalo chips made a clean, hot fire.
9. Traveling west was long, difficult, and required a lot of work. Sadly, many died because of accidents or disease.
10. The journey was over 2,000 miles and lasted four to five months.
